## Congress Report

10<sup>th</sup> International Congress of IATDMCT, September 9-14, 2007, in Nice, France – Highlights relevant to GTFCh and TIAFT

The International Association of Therapeutic Drug Monitoring and Clinical Toxicology (IATDMCT) held its biannual international meeting in Nice. Over 550 scientists and 50 accompanying persons from 40 countries attended this meeting. Besides workshops and symposia with invited speakers, 95 oral presentations and 209 posters were presented to well-attended audiences and intensively discussed throughout the week. The Acropolis congress Centre allowed plenary and parallel sessions and in the very wide floor sections for exhibits, posters and round tables to accommodate seated French lunches.

On Monday, Pascal Kintz and Olaf Drummer organized two joint symposia of IATDMCT with The International Association of Forensic Toxicologists (TIAFT) and the Hair Testing Society (SOHT) one on alternative matrices in clinical and forensic toxicology focusing on hair and one on oral fluid testing with the following invited speakers: Carmen Jurado, Hans Sachs, Vincent Cirimele, Fritz Pragst as well as Olaf Drummer, Alain Verstraete, Denis Crouch and Pirjo Lillsunde. These well-attended symposia have been highlights of the meeting.

The IATDMCT Young Scientists group, installed in Louisville (KY) by the President-elect Hans H. Maurer, had his first platform in Nice. Organized by the committee chairman Frank T. Peters and his secretary Denise McKeown, the young scientists started with a lunch meeting followed by their first workshop. The young scientists gave 17 oral presentations and numerous poster presentations during the week demonstrating their welcomed presence.
